OPEROO

My thanks to our staff for the updates and notices sent to families via 'Operoo' during the January period. Please ensure you check yours emails for any new communication from the school.

For the benefit of our new school families the 'Operoo' app is a very flexible mobile app that communicates directly with iPhone and Android devices. School newsletters, school notices and alerts will be communicated directly to parents who have smartphone access through this school mobile app. This app is free to our families.



The front entrance gates to the school will remain locked until 8.30am each day. Please note the school offers before and after school care for early arrivals and late pickups. <u>There are no teachers on duty prior</u> to 8.30am.

Please note that classes start promptly at 8.50am.

Late comers are asked to report to the school office via the school office entrance.

Final dismissal is at 3.20pm and staff will supervise the school exit points for 20 minutes after dismissal.

Please note that during this time of 'COVID normal' our dismissal time can change depending on recommendations from the State Government and Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools [MACS]. Families will be notified of any changes to the end of the day procedures.

Numeracy

Week 2 - Welcome

Welcome to 2021, a new year to develop and grow together in Mathematics!

This year you students will be guided and nurtured by their classroom teachers and school mathematics leaders Kate Horley (F-2) and Simone Clarke (3-6). Each week we will provide you with some useful mathematics tips and important information through the school newsletter. To kickstart the year, this first article focuses on how to support math learning and encourage your child(ren) to love mathematics.

You are also their math teacher

We all know that reading with a child helps literacy skills, and that playing sports in the backyard teaches the value of teamwork and being physically active. But where are the life lessons for mathematics?

The truth is that we all use mathematics many times each day, but often don't realize it. From trips to the grocery store to swinging in a hammock, math is part of our daily lives.

Don't underestimate your own math skills. You can help your child learn math!

Be a math role model

Children learn by imitating the people around them. Imitating a parent's positive attitude about education helps children develop healthy academic skills.

- Talk out loud as you do everyday tasks. Talking out loud allows children to hear how you think and helps them develop important skills for "thinking things out" and solving problems.
- Do informal math together. On rainy days, family evenings and holiday time, play math games such as Uno, Monopoly, Snakes and Ladders, Rummy-O, Phase 10, Dominoes or Connect Four. Show your child that math is fun!
- Parents worry about the amount of time that children spend on the computer and the quality of online content, but many educational web-based games, such as Math Playground, <u>https://www.education.com/games/math/</u> and Mathfrog, encourage mathematical skills.
- Watch educational television programs like Numberblocks on ABC or Monster Math Squad on Netflix.
- Grocery stores are a great source of math lessons. For example, you can talk aloud about how to weigh fruit on a scale or how to estimate the total cost of groceries as you fill your cart.



Literacy

Reading is an important skill that children first learn at home and it is nurtured in school. Below are some ideas about how to engage a child to read daily. As we know practice makes perfect!

Tips to increasing literacy at home:

1. Read Daily (10-15 minutes)

- Point out words
- Look at the pictures
- Identify the sight words in the story
- Practice sounding out letters and blending them together

2. Visit the local library

- Teach them how to select books they might enjoy
- Allow your child to choose the books they are interested in

3. Make reading interactive


- Act out the story
- Make up different characters or even the ending

4.Use Technology-

Use the "Reading Eggs" app (the classroom teacher will send home their login)

5. Sing, draw and tell stories-

Communication allows a child to develop their oral language skills.

Driving and Parking Safely

To all our families, welcome back to 2021. As a growing school, the beginning and end of the school day are busy times for pedestrians and drivers. It is important that we are always putting the safety of our students first.

Drop-off and pick-up rules exist to keep children, parents and carers safe and to minimise speed and traffic jams around schools. Drop-off and pick-up zones allow you to quickly set down and pick up your children, creating a safe environment while keeping traffic moving. To help us do this we have put together a list of points to remember at these busy times.

- Never double park it is illegal and puts children at risk. The council will issue fines for double parking
- Never call out to them from across the road it is very dangerous
- Always take extra care in 40km school zones
- Follow all parking signs these help keep your child as safe as possible
- Park responsibly even if it means you have to walk further to the school gate
- Never do a U-turn or a three point turn outside the school as it puts children at risk of harm
- Model safe and considerate pedestrian and driver behaviours to your child
- Always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways
- · Remember to please be patient and try to remain calm at all times

Please make sure you communicate with your children so that they know which gate you will be collecting them from at the end of the day. This will help us to dismiss all students quickly and safely.
